




Tassel Garland

Materials needed:

- sturdy cardboard or foam board
- scissors
- crochet hook
- yarn colors of your choice



1. cut cardboard to a size of 8.5" x 4"
2. Per each tassel cut 2 pieces of yarn 15" long
3. Wind yarn around cardboard piece approx. 15 times. (*see picture a*, adjust according to fullness you require)
4. place one piece of yarn from step 2 on a flat surface
5. Gently remove the yarn from the cardboard and place on top of the yarn piece so that it is located in the center.
6. Tie a tight knot around the yarn that was just removed from the cardboard, keep ends long (you will use these end to tie unto the crochet chain. (*see picture b*)
7. Hold the tassel by the two strand and pull the two pieces downward. (*see picture c*)
8. With the second strand of yarn from step 2, make a magic (slip) knot and slide it over the top of the tassel, be sure that the hanging strands are through. (*see picture d*) Pull the knot tight at 3/4" from the top, make a tight knot. Wrap the yarn around several times and finish with tying a secure knot and hide it under the wraps.
9. Now cut the ends to create the tassel, trim the ends as needed to make it even.
10. Voila! You have one completed tassel! (*I used 9 tassels for my garland*)
11. The garland chain is made with a continuous row of crochet chains that measures 60". Leave a little extra on each end so that it can be used to attach to wherever you may want to hang it.
12. Begin by attaching the first garland in the center with a bow and work your way outwards to keep it even. I spaced mine with 8" in between each tassel.



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
